About the Center

Mission

The Saxena Center for Contemporary South Asia promotes research, teaching and public engagement on key issues of modern South Asia in an interdisciplinary framework and in a historically and culturally grounded manner.

About

The Saxena Center is based at the Watson Institute for International and Public Affairs, Brown University. The Center supports faculty, graduate and undergraduate research and teaching on the region and is home to the South Asian Studies concentration.

The Saxena Center functions within the larger framework of the Watson Institute, which is seeking to define a new approach to regional studies for the 21st century. Anchored in the social sciences, this new approach is problem driven, comparative and multidisciplinary. Our multidiciplinarity will include sustained interaction of social scientists with the humanities on the one hand and disciplines such as medicine and public health on the other.

Research & Programs

At this time, the Center's programmatic and research themes focus on inequalities, development, urbanization, democracy, public health and pluralism & diversities.

Director's Note

2023-24 was the second year of the Saxena Center of Contemporary South Asia, our new name as a result of the generosity of Parag and Usha Saxena, Brown parents '13, '14 and '15. The new resources have allowed us to re-imagine our collective life, especially integrating the arts and humanities more prominently in our programming and student research, and making it possible to invite scholars and fellows to take residence for a substantial length of time.

Ali Sethi was our first artist in residence. He taught a three-part non-credit seminar and gave a public lecture, "Raga Saga: Theory and Practice in North Indian Music". The initial expectation was that about 15 students would register for his seminar; in the end, 30 students did. The experiment was hugely successful. Following the same format, we have invited the musician T.M. Krishna, from Chennai, to be with us in the spring. Meanwhile, Anand Patwardhan will be our artist in residence this fall, showing and discussing his famed documentary films.

Arvind Subramanian was our fellow till 2023. Late in the summer, he left for the Peterson Institute, Washington DC. Siddharth Swaminathan joined us for 2023-24 as a faculty fellow. He worked with Patrick Heller and me, helping us complete our data analysis for the long-running project on citizenship and urban governance in India. A team of students worked with us, learning important tools and insights in the process.

Yamini Aiyar will be our fellow this year. Until recently, she was President and Chief Executive of the Centre for Policy Research, Delhi. She will work on her book on welfare politics in India and participate in our activities.

Our Jindal lectures were delivered by Ravish Kumar, the Magsaysay award winning journalist from India, in the fall and by Atul Kohli (Princeton) in the spring. Kumar spoke about the interaction between the media and Indian democracy under Prime Minister Modi. Kohli's lectures were on the evolution of India's political economy since liberalization began in the early 1990s, focusing in particular on the Modi period. Nobel Laureate Esther Duflo (MIT) will be our Jindal lecturer this fall.

In our seminar series, we welcomed Rajmohan Gandhi, the distinguished public intellectual, to the center. He presented his most recent research, in which he documented and analyzed Mahatma Gandhi's influence on Reverend James M. Lawson, a major figure in the American Civil Rights Movement. P. Thiaga Rajan, minister in Tamil Nadu government, spoke on the relationship between India's democracy and its Constitution. Chandrabhan Prasad, a leading Dalit scholar from India, presented his reflections on Dalit Capitalism.

We gave 15 grants for student research, covering topics as wide-ranging as "Thevaram: A Musicological Analysis", "Performing Nationalism in ..Sri Lankan Nationhood", "Paralegal Activism in.. India", and "Prevalence of Mental Health Illness in .. Nepal.

We welcome our new director of undergraduate studies, Tiraana Bains, who teaches in the history department. She has taken the place of Finnian Moore-Gerety, who has left for Oxford. He will, however, continue to be associated with us as a non-resident affiliate.

We also have new staff members, who joined us this past year. Pawan Pandey is our new Program Manager and Natalia Kharkovskaia our new Events and Communications Coordinator.





ABOUT THE BOOK:

As an invitation to interrogate the secular modality of art, the book unsettles both the categories of 'art' and 'secular' in their theoretical and historical implications It questions the temporal, spatial, and cultural binaries between the 'sacred' and the 'secular' that have shaped art

historical scholarship as well as artistic practice. Thinking from the south, all the essays here are anchored in a conception of a region – one fissured by histories of partition, state formations, and religious nationalisms but still offering a collective site from which to speak to the disciplines of art and the knowledge worlds in which they are embedded. The book asks: How do we complicate the religious designations of pre-modern art and architecture and the new forms of their resurgence in contemporary iconographies and monuments? How do we re-conceptualize the public and the political, as fiery contestations and new curatorial practices reconfigure the meaning of art in the proliferating spaces of museums, galleries, biennales and festivals?

Manoj Mitta Caste Pride: Battles for Equality in Hindu India



ABOUT THE BOOK:

Manoj Mitta examines the endurance and violence of the Hindu caste system through the lens of the law. Linking two centuries of legal reform with social movements, he unearths the characters, speeches, confusions and decisions that have shaped the war on caste,

mitigating how this ancient institution discriminated between Hindus across the board. Where they could live, how they could dress, whether they could go to a shop, a stream, walk a street or mingle, enter a temple, whom and how they could marry, which scriptures applied to whom, whether their actions, innocent or criminal, would attract punishment or impunity.

Through these histories of reform, Mitta establishes that untouchability is merely the best-known aspect of varna, an elusive purity-based hierarchy that affects the freedoms of all. With ground-breaking discoveries and incisive insight, Caste Pride is at once moving, enlightening and transformative.



ABOUT THE BOOK:

As the Global South rapidly urbanizes, millions of people have migrated from the countryside to urban slums, which now house one billion people worldwide. The transformative potential of urbanization hinges on whether and how poor migrants are integrated into city politics.

In Migrants and Machine Politics: How India's Urban Poor Seek Representation and Responsiveness, SIS Professor Adam Auerbach and Tariq Thachil (University of Pennsylvania) draw on years of fieldwork in urban north India to argue against conventional portrayals of migrant settlements as politically subdued, bought-off, or polarized by local dons and political 'machines.'

Auerbach and Thachil show how migrants actively construct and populate the political networks that connect them to city governments. To do so, they generate and wield intense political competition to sow unexpected, important, and imperfect seeds of accountability within urban politics.

Swapnil Rai Networked Bollywood: How Star Power Globalized Hindi Cinema



ABOUT THE BOOK:

Networked Bollywood provides an interdisciplinary analysis of the role of the stars in the transformation of Hindi cinema into a global entertainment industry. The first Indian film was made in 1913. However, filmmaking was recognized as an industry almost a hundred years later. Yet, Indian films have been circulating globally since their inception.

This book unearths this oft-elided history of Bollywood's globalization through multilingual, transnational research and discursive cultural analysis. The author illustrates how over the decades, a handful of primarily male megastars, as the heads of the industry's most prominent productions and corporations, combined overwhelming charismatic affect with unparalleled business influence. Through their "star switching power," theorized here as a deeply gendered phenomenon and manifesting broader social inequalities, India's most prominent stars instigated new flows of cinema, industrial collaborations, structured distinctive business models, influenced state policy and diplomatic exchange, thereby defining the future of Bollywood's globalization.

SherAli Tareen Perilous Intimacies: Debating Hindu-Muslim Friendship After Empire



ABOUT THE BOOK:

Perilous Intimacies: Debating Hindu-Muslim Friendship After Empire. Friendship—particularly interreligious friendship—offers both promise and peril. After the end of Muslim political sovereignty in South Asia, how did Muslim scholars grapple with the possibilities and dangers of Hindu-Muslim friendship?

In this groundbreaking book, SherAli Tareen explores how leading South Asian Muslim thinkers imagined and contested the boundaries of Hindu-Muslim friendship from the late eighteenth to the mid-twentieth centuries. He argues that often what was at stake in Muslim scholarly discourse and debates on Hindu-Muslim friendship were unresolved tensions and fissures over the place and meaning of Islam in the modern world. Perilous Intimacies considers a range of topics, including Muslim scholarly translations of Hinduism, Hindu-Muslim theological polemics, the question of interreligious friendship in the Qur'an, intra-Muslim debates on cow sacrifice, and debates on emulating Hindu customs and habits.

ABOUT THE BOOK:

Sheikh Abdullah: The Caged Lion of Kashmir, a biography of the controversial Kashmiri leader, was recently published by HarperCollins India in its prestigious "Indian Lives" series (2024). The Yale University Press edition of the book will be released in summer 2024. The book has been reviewed widely and has been at the top of the

Several fellowships have supported her research over the years, including the National Endowment for the Humanities Fellowship (2005-2006), the Kluge Fellowship at the Library of Congress (2008), and a Senior Research fellowship from the American Institute of Indian Studies (2014-2015). A winner of the 2014 Plumeri Award for Faculty Excellence and two endowed professorships at William & Mary, she also serves on the International Advisory Board of South Asia: Journal of South Asian Studies.
